Introducing... Captain Book!

Many of you might remember the days when the Tillamook County Library brought the official Curious George costume to the fair and local parades. All of that fun came to a screeching halt when the company that rented the costume restricted its use to inside venues only. This left me with a problem: what could possibly take the place of a curious monkey who loved to interact with library patrons?

I tried to buy a Curious George costume from the publisher but was told that no one can buy Curious George. And he's a copyrighted character which meant we couldn't make our own monkey costume, so it was back to the drawing board. I conversed with companies across the country

but every option seemed lackluster (and extremely expensive) in comparison.

As good luck would have it, Diane Colcord, a longtime friend of the library, connected us with Carolyn Carr. Carolyn taught theater costume design at Reed College for several decades. She recently retired after an illustrious career that found her award-winning designs gracing stages near and far. The only problem we had was Carolyn was retired and was not actively pursuing new jobs so we had to come up with an amazing idea that she couldn't refuse.

Because I wore the Curious George costume on numerous occasions, I knew that the huge head made some children terrified...plus it was unbelievably hot, so I wanted to come up with a "face character". That way, children could interact and converse with a real human face and not a mute, furry head.

I must have considered hundreds of mascot ideas, but I kept coming back to the rich pirate lore of the coastal region and a Captain Hook character. But what does that have to do with libraries? Suddenly, the idea of Captain **Book** popped into my head and Carolyn loved the idea.

Six months and several fittings later, Diane and Carolyn presented us with the final, amazing costume. The

best news of all? All labor was donated for the costume and we only paid for the materials! Plus, Diane created a little bookworm puppet that Captain Book can entertain the children with. What a gift!

Since then, I've appeared as Captain Book in five parades and I'm pleased to share that, along with his Book Cart Drill Team, we won several awards for these appearances. I've also conducted several pirate storytimes and hung out at the county fair in costume.

It was a whirlwind of a summer, but let me review a few of the highlights with you.

In just two months, we had over

90 programs for children, teens and adults. We celebrated an open house at each branch library and the book cart drill team participated in five parades around the county. Thank you again for clapping and cheering for us in the parades! I hope you had as much fun as the Library Staff did! We introduced our new library mascot, Captain Book. Manzanita celebrated the 30th anniversary of the library branch building. The South Tillamook County Library in Pacific City had a NASA Ambassador on hand for programs and for the eclipse. The main library had wonderful crafts to engage the adults. Teens had fun programs and we set the record for the largest number to ever sign up for Teen Summer Reading. The children had their weekly programs and kept track of their progress on their reading logs. People of all ages won prizes for reading! It does not get any better than that!

Of course our main goal is to keep the kids reading so they do not go backward in the summer. Teens are socializing with each other through reading and games. Adults keep the brain going with all of the reading activities. I will admit we are all tired from the fun! Our new schedule of programs is coming out in this newsletter. Have you been into the Library Bookstore recently? For those who don't know, the Library Bookstore was planned by the Library Board and Foundation for the new Main Library. Clarice Maxwell, a long term board and foundation member, was involved in the planning and volunteered for years until she was unable due to her health. The Bookstore sells the donated and unneeded books that are given to the Library and that money goes into programs for the public. It is a win/win for everyone! Volunteers keep the bookstore open 11:00 AM to 3:00 PM on Monday through Saturday. If you are interested in working in the Bookstore, ask for a volunteer form the next time you come in. You can meet people from all over the world.

In 2015, Clarice Maxwell left a gift from her will to purchase the property next door to the Main Library. Clarice had a dream that a library park would be built so library patrons could enjoy the outdoors in good weather. Clarice's gift is making the park possible.

With the help of public input, the park was designed in 2016 by the library architect, Rich Turi. The park will have seating areas and a stage area that will accommodate 200 people for various programs. Native plants and trees will complement the park as a learning garden for the public. There will be cozy sitting areas around the large tree on the lot as well as other locations throughout the park. In April 2017, the park construction was put out for bids but no general contractor bid on the project. The park will be bid out again in January 2018 and hopefully a contractor will bid on the project.




The days are getting shorter, and the weather is getting worse. Forced back inside after a wonderful summer, how will you pass the time? By learning! Learn something new from the comfort of your home (or from the library) with our online databases. Think of it like an extra special website that just happens to cost money...but the library pays the cost for you!

It sounds too good to be true, but the library buys a subscription to these valuable learning tools and then you get to access them for free! While we have a large number of databases for you to choose from, we'll be highlighting a few this fall.

In September we will highlight the **Mango Languages** database, home to lessons in nearly 60 languages where your progress is trackable. Once you've mastered Italian, (or Icelandic, or Igbo) you can take it a little easier in October with **Hoopla**. Choose from ebooks, digital audiobooks, movies, tv episodes, music, or comic books to check out on your computer or device. While you only get four per month, you never have to wait in line.

Then in November, check out Zinio for magazines. Now that the app has been renamed **RB Digital**, you'll find a few changes to the magazine titles as well. What hasn't changed is the immersive color experience and getting to keep the issues on your device forever. It's the perfect way to pass the time during your Thanksgiving travels...or while everyone else is taking that Thanksgiving nap. You won't have to wait for your favorite title to arrive in the mailbox—download it as soon as it's published with RB Digital/Zinio.
