A Message from the Library Director



People often ask me how the Tillamook County Library is funded. They assume the funding comes from the County or the City budget, but the library is funded differently.

100% of our funding comes from a five year operating levy. Our current levy began during the recession of 1983, when there was not enough money to fund all county services. It started out as a two year levy, then a three year levy and now we have been on a five year levy since 1999. This has worked well because we can plan our services and help the public in the long term. If the levy does not pass every 5 years, the library closes because there is no authority to spend money. This is state law and there is no way to change that.

Our levy pays for staff (27 people), books and all library materials, programs, computers, internet, services and our membership in the Oceanbooks Network with Lincoln City and Newport Public Libraries. Tillamook County also owns the Main Library and the Bookmobile. Our five branch buildings are owned by other entities. North County Branch (Manzanita), Rockaway Branch, and South County (Pacific City) are owned and maintained by their local Library Friends organizations. Bay City Branch and Garibaldi Branch are owned by the two cities, creating a wonderful partnership that allows us to reside in their City Halls. This arrangement saves the library thousands of dollars since we don't have to pay rent or maintain a building.

Public libraries in the United States are not set up to be private, closed institutions. All of our services are free for the public so all people will have access to education and entertainment, as well as cultural offerings and lifelong learning. You do have to live in or have property in Tillamook County to obtain a library card and to check out items. The library focuses on the residents of Tillamook County but everyone is welcome to come in and use our services.

The Library is a great value to the residents of Tillamook County. The latest nationwide study found that:

• 32.5 million people received expert assistance in using library technology resources to help them achieve educational goals last year.

• 70% of parents report their children use the public library and 77% of student library users between the ages of 12 and 17 used the library for homework.


• Every day 300,000 Americans get job-seeking help from library staff at their public library.

• 30 million people a year use library computers and Internet access

for employment or career purposes. As you can see, libraries are more popular than ever and busier than ever! Last year the Tillamook County Library had 195,000 people visiting the library. I think only the visitor center for the Tillamook County Creamery Association surpasses the library in the number of people visiting yearly.



As the Tillamook County Library completes the first year of our five year Futures Plan, we ar



Goal One: All residents are aware of and use the library.

- Library cardholders increased by 9.7% (exceeding the plan's 5% goal). Almost three fourths of Tillamook county residents are library cardholders.
- Attendance at library programs and events doubled to an average of over 1,100 a month, rising from a total of 6,812 attendees in 2015-16.
- Residents enjoyed new ways to engage with the library, including an annual community survey and a seasonal print newsletter.

Goal Two:

Residents experience a library that is convenient, easy to use, and rewarding.

- When surveyed, 84% of county residents agreed or strongly agreed that the library is easy and convenient to use.
- Your library added two new bookmobile stops at Fairview Grange and South Prairie Store, increasing countywide access to library materials and services.
- The number of programs for children, teens and adults almost tripled from 351 to 968.
- Thanks to a generous private donation, work began last year on a new park adjacent to the Tillamook Main Library, which will open in 2017. Your library also supported the renovation of the North Tillamook Library in Manzanita by the Friends of the Library.

Goal Three: **Residents recognize that they get good value for the dollar.**

- In the last year, your library increased efficiency by installing RFID (Radio Frequency Identification) technology and self-checkout machines in all facilities. These improvements will save the library money for years to come.
- When surveyed, 92.5% of county residents agreed or strongly agreed that the library provides good value to our community.
- Similarly, 85% of county residents agreed or strongly agreed that they are satisfied with the services provided by the library.

Goal Four:

Residents and community members know the library is a valuable resource and active partner in helping improve the quality of life in Tillamook County.

- In the library's annual community survey, 91% of county residents agreed or strongly agreed that the library helps build a better community through learning and knowledge.
- In the last year, your library has actively expanded partnerships with a wide range of organizations, including CARE, Helping Hands and Homeless Connect. We work together to ensure that Tillamook County is a great place to live for everyone.




I had the privilege of filling in at the Garibaldi Library recently and I decided to make a note of a few of the patron interactions I had that day. If you've ever thought a small library in a little town might not be necessary, this diary might give you a new perspective.

2:10 PM – THE COURIER VAN DELIVERY ARRIVES

Three days per week, our courier van drives to each of the branch libraries in our system and brings requested materials to each of our libraries. We are fortunate to have formed a partnership called Oceanbooks that shares collections with the Driftwood and Newport libraries.

2:33 PM – RESUMÉ HELP

A young man comes in and needs help finishing and printing a job resumé. He gets the job done and is pleasantly



jumps on the public computer to check her email, and the third patron brings his laptop in to use the library's free wireless signal.

12:15 PM - "WHERE IS NORMA?"

I will answer this question a dozen or more times today. The community counts on seeing "their librarian" every day to handle their information needs. 1:06 PM - PICKING UP AN "ILL"

When the library doesn't carry an item people want, we either purchase that item, or we request an Inter Library Loan (ILL). Today I check out an ILL book that we borrowed from a library in Fairbanks, Alaska.

1:36 PM – HOOPLA HELP

Using our new online loaning system called Hoopla, users can instantly download music albums, movies, TV shows, audiobooks, e-books and comics, 24/7 using their library card. Several people asked for Hoopla help today and they were all surprised at how easy it was.

3:16 PM – BUYING A HOUSE

A frantic visitor from Arizona comes in and says she is trying to buy a house in Garibaldi but her laptop stopped working and she needs to get on the Internet to accept the seller's counter offer. 3:55 PM – PREPARING FOR THE STORM!

A winter storm is brewing, so all day long I have been checking out large quantities of movies and books for people who don't plan on going anywhere for the next few days.

4:10 PM – DRIVER'S LICENSE HELP, ETC

The library is the hub of the community for so many reasons, but being a place to get information is at the heart of what we do. Today, I handed out a driver's license exam study book, a kayaking guide for Tillamook Bay, and several other free publications we keep on hand.

4:23 PM – HOW DOES THIS THING WORK?

I fielded technology questions about an iPhone, an e-reader and a laptop. If the staff person on the desk can't help, we can set you up with a one-on-one appointment with our computer expert. 4:58 PM – ROAD TRIP HELP! Just as I was about to lock the door, a family rushed in to get some books on CD to help the family survive a multiday road trip.

As you can see, today's library is about so much more than just books. Whether we are helping someone apply for a job, presenting a storytime, hosting a class about playing the ukulele or just finding the perfect book for a certain patron, it is so easy to see how vital our libraries are to our communities. We hope you will stop in for a visit today and discover how great it is that "libraries still exist"!

We love books. We love seeing you with your arms full of books. But when that book is a Chilton Auto Repair manual weighing five pounds that could fall on your face while you're lying under your car's hood, we also love telling you that all of Chilton's Auto Repair manuals are available online through our website! Narrow down the car and problem, print off a few pages, and take it home with no fear of injuries.

And that's not the only online information you may find useful. By now, many of you have heard of our digital e-content app based services like Zinio, Library-2Go, and Hoopla. But you might be less aware of many of our journal article databases. Through these databases, you can search everything from popular magazines to academic journals to find

articles on any topic you want. Get book recommendations using Novelist, or see the path of your investments using ValueLine. Learn career skills, including tutorials on common software programs like Microsoft Office with Learning Express Library. If you have kids doing homework, we have digital access to the World Book Encyclopedias with different articles geared to different age levels. Working on family history? Use the Heritage Quest database to view census records and sign up for our family history workshop in January! You can get legal help, look at historical newspapers and magazine articles, or do research for a school project. Are you dealing with a recent medical diagnosis? Find a book to give you a good overview, and then use the Health and Wellness Resource Center to dig a little


