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Announcing...

Enjoy streaming movies, audiobooks, music—and more—with Hoopla!

In October, a brand new library collection will be available to library card holders in Tillamook County. It features thousands of streaming movies, television shows, audiobooks, eBooks, comics and full music albums. Called Hoopla, this dynamic service gives you the freedom to experience, explore and enjoy what you want, whenever and wherever you want it. Available instantly, Hoopla materials have automatic returns, no late fees and no hold lines.

You can check out movies and TV shows for three days, music albums for seven days, and audiobooks and digital comics for 21 days. (Limit of 4 items per person, per month).

To get started, all you need is your Tillamook County Library card and a web browser, smart phone or tablet. You'll find Hoopla under the E-Resources tab on the library's home page (tillabook.org).

A Sneak Peek At Your Library's Report Card

As your library completes the first year of the five year Tillamook County Library Futures Plan, we are excited to report some very positive results. Below are highlights from our 2015-16 library scorecard, which will be available later this fall.

• A 9.7% increase in library cardholders, exceeding the plan's goal of a 5% increase.

• Increased library programming for all ages, such as DIY programs for adults and teens.

• Enhanced community engagement, including a seasonal library newsletter, an annual community survey, and staff presentations and library open houses across the county, throughout the year.

• Streamlined operations, made more efficient with RFID (Radio Frequency Identification) technology and self-check machines.

• Improved facilities, including initial planning for a library park adjacent to the Tillamook Main Library and supporting the renovation of the North Tillamook Library in Manzanita by the Friends of the Library.

• Expanded bookmobile service, including two added stops and visits to special community events.

• Expanded community partnerships. With active partners such as the County Health Department, Helping Hands, CARE, Salvation Army and Homeless Connect, your library is helping to ensure that Tillamook County is a great place to live, work and play for everyone.

In our first annual community survey, your library also received positive feedback from residents across the county:

• 92.5% agreed or strongly agreed that the library provides good value to our community.

• 91% agreed or strongly agreed that the library helps build a better community through learning and knowledge.

• 85% agreed or strongly agreed that they are satisfied with the services provided by the library, and that the library is easy and convenient to use.

While we are happy with these results, we are also committed to continuous improvement. A primary benefit of the Futures Plan (available on the library's website) is that it offers a framework for planning and executing programs and services with greater effectiveness and intentionality. In the years to come, we will continue to utilize this framework to improve library services and to explore new ways to effectively meet community needs.

Here at the library we begin teaching children the rhythm of language in Mother Goose on the Loose baby storytime. We continue the fun in Terrific Twos for toddlers and Preschool storytime for 3-5 year-olds. In these early literacy classes we focus on reading, singing, talking, playing and writing with your little ones. Your child will experience music, instruments, creative play, bubbles, balls, parachutes, puppets, rhymes and so much more! All of this activity trains your child's brain to be "ready-to-read." Once kids have a solid early literacy foundation, their brains are ready to recognize the patterns in words and therefore will have a much easier time learning to read. Reading is the key to school success.

Main Library Celebrates its 10th Birthday!

Sara Charlton, Library Director The Main Library is ten years old? This is hard to believe! It took so long and so much work to make it happen. It is amazing to look back at this incredible success story!

In the mid-1980s the Library Board recognized that the current Library (210 Ivy Street, now North Coast Home Health) was not going to last forever. That building was built in 1949 as a car dealership. When the Tucker automobiles were out in the late fifties, one was on display in the dealership! The Library had purchased the property in 1962 and opened in 1963. The Library Board decided to plan ahead for a new Library. The Library Foundation was created in 1987 to be able to receive tax free donations. It took 5 years to get 501(c)(3)status.



The Main Library struggled with trying to find donated property for the new Main Library. Senator Mark Hatfield and Gerry Franks tried to help the Library to obtain the old McGregor building (where the new Safeway parking lot is now) and that did not happen. Senator Hatfield called often to check on the project and offer advice. It was an honor for me to have conversations with the Senator during those years. The Senator agreed to be our Honorary Campaign Chair since he lived in the County. The old Amory property was coming back to the City and that was a possibility, but that did not happen either. One



day Library Board member Clarice Maxwell's spouse, Stu Maxwell, learned that Copeland Lumber in Tillamook was closing and the property was going to be sold.

Stu ran to the Library with a phone number to call. When I called the number I had no clue who I was talking to. A very nice woman told me they would be in touch. After the call ended I learned that I was talking to the President of Copeland who wanted to do something for the community, since Copeland was closing. The Copeland President assigned a staff member, who grew up in Tillamook, to negotiate with the Library. The Library did not have the funds to purchase the property, and not a lot of money for a down payment. The Copeland family worked it out that they would hold the contract for us with a minimum down payment. After doing a fast community survey to see what

people thought about the site, the deal was worked out and the Library finally had property to plan the building!

Richard Turi, a Library Architect from North Bend, Oregon was hired to design the Library. Rich Turi has designed about 35 libraries around Oregon from Florence, to Sisters, Burns, Prineville, and Seaside. A meeting for public input was held on May 1, 2000 with many very interested residents coming to provide input about what they would like to see in their new Library. In August 2000,

the plans for the new Main Library were displayed for the public.

2001 - The Library Board, Library Foundation and Tillamook County Commissioners met to decide how to go forward. It was decided to do a citizen petition to prove there was interest for a new Main Library before the Commissioners would place it on the ballot. The petition gathering began at the Fair 2001. Then Sept 11, 2001 happened. Everything stopped due to the shocking events of that day. We waited until March 2002 to start up the petition again out of respect. At the end of July 2002 we had about 1,000 signatures and we only needed 800!

The Commissioners placed the new Main Library on the ballot in 2002. We were not lucky and the building bond did not get the votes needed to pass! Everyone that had worked so long and so hard was



devastated. Back to the drawing board! Feedback was that people thought the furniture should not be in the bond. The Library Foundation agreed to do more fundraising for furniture and any extra needs. Once again the Library Board asked the Commissioners to place the building on the ballot for \$3.7 million. In September of 2003, after 15 years of working on this project, the voters approved the building bond!

2004 - The grant writing began. The foundations that we were everything was heading to Louisiana following the Katrina Storm. Construction costs increased \$500,000 in a month. All of us were in a panic that the project could not be finished with the funding we had. The decision was made to move ahead and to keep applying for grants.

Our supporters were wonderful, paying for brick, shelving, chairs, tables etc. The best furniture, which is made extra-durable for academic libraries, came in lower than expected so we would be as-



applying to wanted to see a bond passed before they had interest in our applications. Now we could apply with actual dollar figures. Happily working with the architect and grant writing, the new Main Library broke ground March 25, 2005 during a horrible rain storm. We used the old shed on the property and the Bookmobile to have the ceremony and then the party moved to the old Library.

In August 2005, Hurricane Katrina hit Louisiana. Before we knew it, plywood costs had gone up overnight from \$12 to \$34. It was hard obtaining building supplies at the original price because sured at having beautiful furniture that would last 50 years. A donor purchased the puppet stage in the Children's Room, another bought a study room. A couple from Portland contacted us to donate the funds for the furniture in the Teen area. A Board member donated all the landscaping and the irrigation system. We had donations from \$1 to thousands, but we still had \$500,000 to raise, because of the Katrina after effects.

The Library Foundation had planned to have a contest for a mural for the Children's Room. After receiving art ideas from many wonderful artists, the Foundation had narrowed the work down to two very different styles. As everyone agonized on which one to select, the decision was made to have both murals. The Children's Mural, by Julie Henson, is the lovely bright one going into the Children's Room. Helen Hill painted the one going up the stairs to the adult area. Donors graciously paid for this wonderful art!

The last year of the building project, Mr. Hampton, owner of Hampton Lumber would check on us to see how the funding was going. Mr. Hampton died in March 2006, but he had planned for others to keep checking on the project. The company provided us with a \$100,000 check to finish the project!

The GALA Ball for all the donors was held September 23, 2006. The Grand Opening was September 30, 2006, 19 years after the Library Board made a goal for a new Main Library. What an amazing journey to have been a part of all of it!

The Library Board, the Library Foundation and the Library Staff hope you will come celebrate the 10-year birthday of the new Main Library.



Training Wheels

One of the best days of my life came when I was six years old and my dad decided it was time to take the training wheels off my bike.

For more than a year I had trusted those training wheels to keep me upright. They taught me how to balance, how to turn corners and most importantly, how to perform a cool dismount.

But one day, I came home to find my dad with a wrench in one hand and my training wheels in the other. I panicked at first and shed a few worried tears. Could I stay upright without my trusty training wheels?

Dad convinced me to get on my bike and try riding while he trotted behind, holding on to the back of the bike seat so I wouldn't tip. And it worked! I was actually riding without training wheels and I was elated. After a few blocks, I glanced back and realized my dad was not there. He had let go and I was truly riding solo.

I circled back and Dad told me I had passed the test and I could now ride anywhere I wanted to go in our safe little Iowa town. Anywhere!

My six-year-old mind was blown. Should I go to the swimming pool? To the ball field? To my best friend's house? No, none of those would do. My very first solo bike trip was to the public library! Naturally, I checked out far too many books than I could safely ride with so I ended up walking back home.

Looking back, there is a lot of real-life symbolism in this story. The training wheels could be an analogy for all the work and instruction my parents, teachers and the library provided from the time I was a youngster. Their guidance in my early childhood development skills shaped me and gave me confidence to learn and grow, and to get ready for the day when the "training wheels" came off so I could blossom in a school setting. Unfortunately, not all young children have parents who make certain their children are prepped for school. As a result, more and more of these childhood development skills fall into the hands of your public library. We become the training wheels the students rely on to succeed in life. And the library is not just an important part of early childhood development. We stay focused on children at every stage of their lives... grade school programs, teen meetings and more.

Could I have learned to ride a bicycle without training wheels? Maybe...but it would have been a tough challenge with lots of skinned knees along the way.

Could I have been a good student without all the help from my public library? Maybe...but maybe not. Why take a chance? Make sure your kids get to the library today.
