# A Pearl of a Library in Bay City



The Bay City Library is nearing its 100 year anniversary, helping locals with their reading needs.

In 1922, a small group of women collected books and established the Bay City Library. This small-but-mighty library joined the Tillamook County Library as a branch in 1947. Residents of Bay City paid an extra \$1.00 on their water bill to pay for a new fire truck but once the fire truck was purchased, residents voted to continue paying the extra \$1.00 to build a library annex onto the new City Hall. The new library opened on April 1, 1964.

How many people use the Bay City Library? Currently 909 patrons in the 97107 zip code have library cards, which is outstanding for the population. Total transactions for the Branch (excluding the count for wireless) is currently over

18,000 per year! Staff member Debby Riley presents weekly storytimes for the young children and organizes the Summer Reading program for children. Area adults have always relied heavily on the library for their reading and Internet needs.

The Bay City Library is open Tuesday- Friday from noon-5pm and Saturdays, 10am-3pm. Wi-Fi and our online services including downloadable books, reference databases, encyclopedias and e-magazines are available 24/7.

In addition to the many wonderful programs and services the library offers, the Bay City Library's "Baby Salmon Project" has enjoyed national attention for being such a unique and educational program. In 2010, Diane Griffin asked to have the baby salmon in the library. All ages of library patrons love to see the salmon start as eggs and grow from there. Once Diane determines the timing is right, the library invites the public to attend a salmon release activity and residents of all ages get the thrill of releasing a salmon into the local streams. Many people say this activity is one of their favorite library events.

# Tales of a Librarian

For many librarians, there is no greater joy than putting just the right book in the hands of a library patron. When that person is a little child, the thrill is extra exciting for me and I will tell you why.

While I was pursuing my master's degree in Library Science, I discovered so much about how young minds develop and what it takes to become a skilled reader. Children need a rich language and conceptual knowledge base, a deep and broad vocabulary, as well as verbal reasoning abilities to understand messages that are conveyed through printed materials. This does not just happen automatically. It takes a team that consists of dedicated parents or caregivers, school teachers and libraries to provide children with the tools they need to succeed.

Kids who are exposed to the correct knowledge-building language experiences stimulate the parts of the brain that turn their young minds into reading machines. Study after study proves that children who are nurtured in this fashion end up finding school to be a fascinating success, not a lesson in disappointments and frustrations.

That is why I am so happy to be a part of a profession that has a part to play in the development of young brains. And that is also why my ears perked up one day when I was pushing a cart of books into the children's library. I heard a young girl crying, collapsed in apparent agony into her mother's arms. "What is the problem?" I asked.

"Oh nothing," said mom. "We came to the library tonight because she had her heart set on showing me how she could now read *Green Eggs and Ham* all by herself, but all the copies are checked out."

The literary cosmos aligned that day because on the very cart I had just pushed into the kid's room was a brand new replacement copy of *Green Eggs and Ham*! I pulled the shiny cover out and held it in front of the teary face. Seconds later, I was treated to a grin that was absolutely priceless to behold. Of course, the fact that she was missing a few baby teeth made it even more precious.

Mom thanked me profusely but it was not necessary. I got all the thanks I needed as I turned and heard the girl start reading, "I am Sam. Sam I am".
