

The Bookmobile - A Little Library on Wheels

It's BIG. It's blue. And it's coming to a Tillamook County location near YOU!

Many of us in Tillamook County have the luxury of being able to stop into the closest branch of the Tillamook County Library any time we need a new book or DVD. But there are tax-paying citizens of our county that simply don't have that option.

Some live in retirement homes. Others have a disability or are otherwise unable to drive. And then there are those in daycare facilities and classrooms full of preschool children and that would be impossible to transport to a library location. These are just a few examples of why the bookmobile exists. Using this unique mode of mobile delivery, the library is able to serve the ENTIRE county, not just those who are fortunate enough to be able to drop into a physical library location.

"The bookmobile is a vital part of Tillamook County because we are so large and have such a varied population," says Jessica Moran, the one-woman operator of the bookmobile. "This county has a large number of retirees and elderly and it is often extremely hard, and sometimes impossible, for some of them to get into town to get books and materials to help pass the time. I visit people nearly every day who are homebound and we also make regular stops in communities that don't have an established branch library location."

Each week, Jessica logs 300 to 500 miles and sees as many as 200 people. The bookmobile is on the road five days a week with 57 stops in coastal and farming communities on a two-week repeating route. If you've driven in Tillamook county, there is a good chance you have seen the big blue bus on its routes.

Visiting childcare facilities, Headstart locations, preschools and other places where there are children is one of Jessica's favorite parts of the job. "I get to read the children stories and help them pick out books for the classroom," says Jessica.
"These small storytime sessions help to build the child's love of reading and will also help the children I visit become educated members of the community." The bookmobile also supplies many of the teachers at these facilities

with books and materials to help round out their lesson plans.

Town stops are also a very important part of the bookmobile schedule. These are scheduled visits in areas that do not have a physical library branch (see inset schedule) and ANYONE in these locations can stop in and utilize our library services. With stops in Nehalem, Wheeler, Netarts, Oceanside, Hebo, Cloverdale, Sandlake, Beaver and Neskowin, they cover a very large area of the county. Bill Landau, Outreach Librarian, says these stops are often the social event of the week in these communities. "Many patrons in these rural areas consider the bookmobile to be their home library and never miss a visit. They pick up requested holds on the bookmobile and quite often meet their friends and neighbors at these stops."

In addition to these locations, the bookmobile is adding two rural Tillamook stops to help those who don't want to drive all the way to town. "We just started our visits to the Fairview Grange and the South Prairie Market area," says Bill. "So if you are in these locations, please pop in to at least take a look around. Many people who have never seen the insides of a bookmobile often comment that it is just like a little library on wheels, which it truly is." While the collection is small on the bookmobile, it has just a little bit of everything to satisfy the information and entertainment

needs of those who visit.

Another important job for the bookmobile is when it appears in parades around the county, at farmer's markets and of course, the four-day stay at the Tillamook County Fair each August. "The county fair is the time when I really find out how many people are in love with libraries and bookmobiles," says Bill. "I love to see the sparkle in people's eyes as they climb aboard and tell us that they remember how important the bookmobile was to them as a child and they often say those early visits helped to shape them into the readers they are today. You can really see the joy in their eyes when they step inside."

When asked to sum up her job in 15 words or less, Jessica echoed this enthusiasm. Her 15 word description is as follows: "Deliver books and joy around the county to patrons that are not able to get to a library.

Delivering books and joy. No wonder Jessica loves her job so much!

North Tillamook Library Receives \$21,000 Grant from the Oregon Cultural Trust

North Tillamook Library in Manzanita is a recipient of a \$21,201 award from the Oregon Cultural Trust as one of 85 successful grant applications out of a total of 165 submissions from across Oregon. The money will be used to repurpose a room in the Library to serve as a community learning center in addition to providing major upgrades to the rest of the building.

Library renovation will occur in early 2016, and include leveling the northwest corner of the building, installing new carpeting throughout, upgrading to energy efficient lighting and adding new shelving. This work is in preparation for repurposing the Hoffman Room as an education and technology learning space. Books displayed in the Hoffman Room will be moved to other areas in the library. The redesigned space will include electrical outlets throughout and new furniture that will easily configure for classroom presentations, individual work stations and small to large team meetings.

As part of the project, Tillamook County Library has committed to offering increased adult programming in the new space, including an emphasis on technology training following the renovation. Currently, Tillamook County Library has difficulty in offering adult programming at North Tillamook Library due to space limitations.

"To repurpose this space in the existing structure is to open up a world of possibilities," said Bill Landau, Tillamook County Library Extension Manager. "In Manzanita, Nehalem, Wheeler and the surrounding rural community we have a ready, willing and able audience who yearns for the programming we can provide such as group computer classes, open mic events, a photography club, lectures, travelogues and streaming



events." Tillamook County Library has committed to provide a large screen television in the new space to be able to offer streaming content. The project budget totals \$76,400.

In addition to the Oregon Cultural Trust Grant of \$21,201, the budget includes \$15,000 of in-kind contributions from Tillamook County Library; \$33,000 from the Linda Anne Easely bequest received in 2014 and set aside for this purpose; and \$7,199 from North Tillamook Library Friends, proceeds from the recent raffle. "We do not intend to withdraw funds from our Investment Account to complete this project," said Kay Stepp, North Tillamook Library Board president. "Through our partnership with Tillamook County Library, the Oregon Cultural Trust, the Easely Bequest and the generosity and support of North Tillamook Library Friends we can fund this major project from current resources."

"This will be the biggest project undertaken by the Friends since building the Library in 1987," added Stepp. "We learned through the Tillamook County Library Futures Project that library facilities must adapt to the changing needs of information consumers. We now have data on the needs of consumers in our service area and we are excited to be able to provide a library facility that meets those needs. This is our mission."



E-Books are Wonderful!

Through a partnership with the Oregon Digital Library Consortium, the Tillamook County Library has access to downloadable e-books and audiobooks that you can put on your portable device and enjoy anywhere! If you have never used our Library2Go service, now is a great time to try it.

E-books are available in a variety of formats for many portable devices, including Kindle, Apple iOS devices, Android devices, Nook, and smart phones. Using your library card, books are checked out for 1, 2, or 3 weeks. Once a book is due, it simply disappears from your device. There are no overdue fees! Just like a physical book, we only have a certain number of copies of most digital titles. If a book is currently checked out, you may place a hold on the item. When your hold is ready, you'll receive an email to notify you. Your holds can even be checked out to you automatically so you never lose your place in line!

You don't have to have a portable e-reader to take advantage of the service. E-books and audiobooks can also be read on a personal computer.

To start browsing the selection of titles, go to the Library2Go website at library2go.lib.overdrive.com. You will need your library card number and pin number (in most cases, first four letters of last name followed by last four digits of your telephone number-- Ex. smit1234).


