


Thursday, August 7: 126 years ago today the Hatfield-McCoy feud began with the knifing and shooting of Ellison Hatfield.

Saturday, August 30: A magazine sale at the Manzanita Branch Library will be held during regular library hours 10 a.m. - 3 p.m.




Tillamook Libraries on Parade!

Staff's Choice! Hold Tight



I confess to being a plodding reader, usually requiring a month or more to get through any normal-sized novel. For this reason, I always look forward to new titles by Harlan Coben. Mr. Coben's novels allow me the novel (no pun intended) experience of reading a book through from beginning to end, in only one or two sittings. Some critics consider his

work less-than-serious and not worthy of much regard, but from a "wisdom of crowds" perspective, his huge success says otherwise.

While he writes a mystery series featuring sports agent/mystery solver Myron Bolitar, it is the stand alone, everyman-falls-into-dire-circumstance thrillers that provide the object of my reading affection. These works are not just page-turners, but page-burners. His latest work, *Hold Tight*, encompasses several "au courant" themes, including technology-driven generation gaps, teen suicide and drug use, privacy issues, and nosy neighbors.

Like all of his stand-alone novels, *Hold Tight* juxtaposes the familiar (suburbia, issues of career, the challenges of parenting) with the mildly-to-wildly unexpected (organized crime, long lost relatives, past indiscretions, war criminals). While I wouldn't characterize Mr. Coben's novels as "cozy", nor are they unnaturally violent or graphic.

If, like me, you're stuck in a one-book-a-month pattern, put *Hold Tight* on your list... but don't make any other plans for the weekend.
