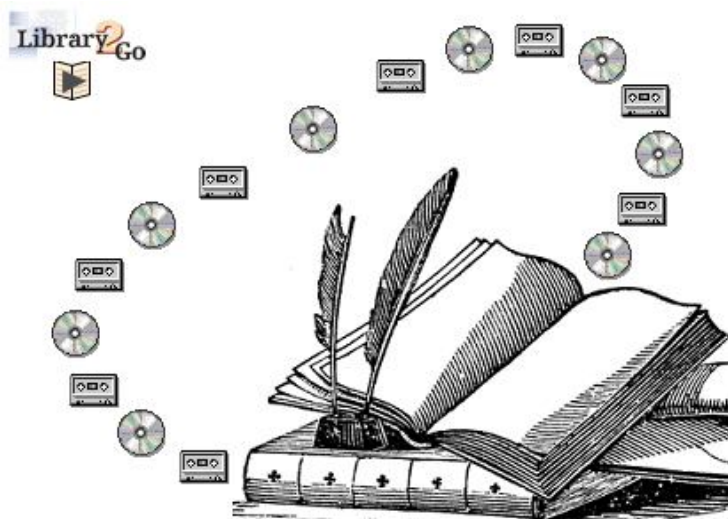


Read More with Audio Books!

The Tillamook County library has a large collection of audio books in a variety of formats. We have books on compact disk and cassette tape, as well as downloadable titles. The downloadable audio books are available with your library card through Library 2 Go. These titles can be particularly convenient as they can be accessed from home. Many titles in Library 2 Go can be burned to CD or saved to an MP3 player or on your computer.

You will need to install the Overdrive Media Console, available for free at the Library 2 Go site, in order to manage your audio books. With a publisher’s date of September 29 this “very readable book” provides a picture of where we are today.

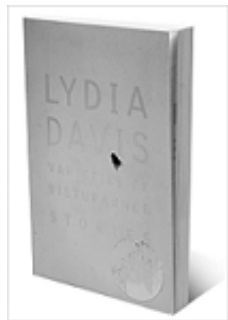
Beyond Greed and Fear: Understanding Behavioral Finance and the Psychology of Investing
